Message from Thom Copestake, Head of School

Many of us working in education live our lives according to the academic year, but the start of a new calendar year always brings a sense of optimism and joy, despite the cold weather and the continued dark nights. Our students, however, continue to grow and develop their knowledge and skills; we are after all, developing the young people who will shape the future of this country. Furthermore, whilst we have a very strong academic focus, we believe there is more to education than what goes on in the classroom. We have recently launched with students



our updated Education with Character programme and our Student Pledges. Designed to develop leadership, organisation, teamwork and communication skills, as well as building in students' adaptability, self-esteem, confidence and resilience, our Education with Character programme is overflowing with opportunities for students to try something new; we want to support our students to achieve the very best of which they are capable, and to motivate and inspire a love of learning which lasts well beyond their years in formal education. Reading and literacy continue to sit at the heart of our teaching and learning; we believe that all students should be able to read fluently and comprehend texts, providing them with the empowerment they will need to be successful in their future. Our universal reading support includes our form time reading programme, guided reading strategies, disciplinary literacy woven into the teaching in every subject, exposure to academic and scholarly texts and teaching students how to comprehend, summarise and take notes. Some students, we know, need a little more support and our intervention programmes – including Lexonik Advanced, Phonics (Read, Write, Inc) and Rapid

Reader, provide opportunities for those who might need additional guidance to ensure they can read and comprehend. At home, you can support students by encouraging them to read regularly, to read aloud and to read a range of texts, both fiction and non-fiction. Our library has a wealth of resources to encourage students to read for pleasure and empowerment so do encourage your child to take advantage of this.

Finally, those of you that drive to drop off and collect students will know how busy the local roads can be around school and the dangers this can pose to residents and our school community. Please be mindful of road safety in the areas surrounding school. Parking or stopping a vehicle is prohibited on any road marked with double yellow lines, within 10 metres of any junction and directly outside a school (indicated by the zig zag lines and the pavement markings). We ask that all parents/carers are equally cautious about not blocking driveways for our residents.

Curriculum Focus

Geography Department.

Geography is an important subject throughout the key stages at WHGS. By studying Geography students learn the importance of understanding the world around them both from a physical (or natural) perspective and a human perspective. This also helps students to gain key skills such as data analysis, critical thinking, and evaluating topics through an enquiry-based process that is used in Geographical fieldwork as well as a range of other subjects. Geographical skills can be easily transferred to other areas of study as well as being essential skills in the world of work in the future.

Students who study GCSE Geography have a high success rate with over 70% of students typically gaining a pass grade or higher, and at A Level classes have a 100% pass rate, representing high quality teaching from the staff in the Geography department, and dedication from students to achieve their goals.



Mathematics Department:

Mathematics at A-level is one of our most popular subjects, boasting fantastic outcomes and successful alumni. One of our most remarkable success stories is Ali Alizadeh, whom we were so lucky to have join us in the Sixth Form. Ali came to the United Kingdom from Iran one year before his A-level study with little English. Ali was one of our Early

Applicants who received support in his application. He received 3 A* grades in Mathematics, Further Mathematics and Physics. He also achieved an A grade in Chemistry. Ali went to read Engineering at Cambridge University in September 2021. Ali was one of the best Mathematics students the school had ever seen, and his favourite subject was Mathematics, so much so he wants to become a teacher of Mathematics. We have been very fortunate to have been joined by Ali this week as he came in to speak to our Year 11 students about taking Mathematics as an A-level. He was kind enough to offer his time and spoke about how much he enjoyed his time at Willaim Hulme's and was complimentary about the support he was offered as well as our class sizes. Ali said, *"I really enjoyed the subjects I was taking for A Levels, Year 13 was more difficult than Year 12 - it was a really different experience. The teachers were great, and they really supported me. Many teachers, Mr Harrison especially, really helped me."*

Sixth Form Focus

We are very proud of our Year 13 students who completed their mock examinations last term with some excellent results. They have a second round of examinations starting in February to ensure they are fully prepared for their final A level examinations in the summer. As usual, our outstanding students handled this with maturity and rigour. Year 12 have just completed their first round of assessments in all subjects, as well as embarked on their student leadership awards.

An important element of our Sixth Form is the opportunity we provide for students to take on student leadership roles. We now have a new team of student prefects who will act as role models to other students including students across all phases whilst supporting staff to promote a positive culture and building high expectations about future pathways.

Life in the Sixth Form is more than just about academic success, although we take this very seriously. We want students to fully immerse themselves in the social side and forge lifelong friendships. We make sure our Sixth Form





events and socials are part of everything we do here; we believe this is what has built the strong sense of community we promote. At the end of the autumn term, we celebrated with a bowling trip to strengthen our sense of belonging. A number of students also took part in Sixth Form basketball as one of our House Competitions. It all became very competitive allowing students to also embrace the social side of the Sixth Form. We are looking forward to our next competition which will be badminton and we are excitedly making plans for our upcoming Culture Day and Sixth Form Iftar.



Revision and Study Skills

This week, students have attended assemblies on how to study effectively. The purpose is to empower all our students to be able to remember their learning by making regular, independent study a habit. Students were introduced to the acronym **FAST**: is revision Focused, Active, Sustained and Transformed?



- Focused: ensure revision is distraction-free, in a quiet and calm environment.
- Active: the most effective revision involves thinking hard. We can do this through trying to recall knowledge from memory.
- Sustained: the best revision is 'little and often' to ensure that we remember learning in the long-term. We should avoid cramming and spread our study out over several shorter sessions.
- Transformed: in order to demonstrate understanding of our learning, we should practise transforming it into different formats such as flashcards, mind maps, quizzes, brain dumps etc.

Year 11 students now have revision timetables which they should complete, bearing the above principles in mind. If any student is unsure about how best to revise, they are welcome to speak to class teachers and form tutors, who will give them further guidance. Good Luck!




