
On Friday 12 January, our Y12 History and Politics students attended a workshop on US Civil Rights and Political Ideas in the 1960s at the University of Manchester. This consisted of a seminar in the morning, delivered by Dr Andrew Fearnley, entitled 'A Complex King: Martin Luther King Jr, 1963-68.

The students then travelled up to the Ahmed Iqbal Ullah Race Relations Archive at Manchester Central Library and looked at primary source material from various civil rights campaigns and events, from as far back as the early 1900s.

To finish the day, Dr Fearnley led another seminar, dealing with the US political system and its role in the movement for civil rights. We also stopped for lunch at the Whitworth Art Gallery Cafe, again hosted by the University.

All students involved really enjoyed the chance to experience a taste of university life, and to hear from one of the country's leading academics on American History, Politics and Culture. This work directly links to the curriculum for both courses, with students of History and Politics studying the US in detail over the course of their two-year A-Level.

This event is another great example of the work that the University of Manchester does to inspire and engage students from across the city, hopefully encouraging them to pursue Higher Education.


A group of our Year 11 History students attended a 'Cold War Study Day', hosted by the University of Manchester at Jodrell Bank Centre in Cheshire.

The day consisted of a film about the history of Jodrell Bank and the world-famous Lovell Telescope, two lectures from University of Manchester professors and a primary sources workshop. All of these activities were focussed on how significant the Lovell Telescope and Jodrell Bank site were during the Cold War, which played out across the twentieth century with the USA and the then USSR competing to build advanced space technology.

The Jodrell Bank site was vital to monitoring and covering the activities of both superpowers, and the information the student learned on Monday will be extremely useful in their 'Superpower Relations and Cold War' GCSE exams in a few months.



Manchester Youth Indoor Rowing Competition

A group of our pupils attended the Manchester Youth Indoor Rowing Competition on Wednesday 24 January. Pupils were all selected due to their involvement in a rowing project with Agecroft Rowing Club in Salford Quays.

The Competition format for the day was intense and each student took part in several races across the day. The various races included:

- Year 8 Individual 3 minute race (girls and boys)
- Year 9 Individual 4 minute race (girls and boys)
- Year 8 Open/Girls Relay an 8 minute race for teams of up to 4 athletes (Open = male or female, Girls = female only)
- Year 9 Open/Girls Relay an 8 minute race for teams of up to 4 athletes (Open = male or female, Girls = female only)

Throughout the day, all pupils showed grit and determination in their races; they were competing against several schools from across the North West. The fastest 24 athletes (12 girls and 12 boys) on the day were invited to compete at the National Indoor Rowing Championships in London on 1 March 2024. We had one pupil selected, congratulations to Maryam from Year 8.

Our Year 12 and 13 Product Design students visited the Renew Hub recently, to see first-hand how Greater Manchester is reducing the amount of waste going to landfill, as well as understanding more about what is done in the name of sustainability.

Students saw how a range of household products; from white goods, to bikes and furniture, are repaired and up-cycled and sold, in order to reduce waste and raise money for charities.


Students also got the opportunity to see how Krispy Kreme donuts were manufactured in batches, ready for distribution around Manchester. They even got to try them.

Sufiyaan Wins Runner Up at StorySLAM

On Tuesday 6 February, one of our Year 5 pupils, Sufiyaan, took home the Runner Up prize in this year's northern StorySLAM final, hosted by Cravenwood Primary School.

StorySLAM is an annual competition run by United Learning for pupils in Years 5 and 6, which challenges them to write their own 200-300 word stories to then perform in front of their peers. Inspired by a similar event which began in New York, the aim of the competition is to develop children's creativity, confidence and literacy skills in a supportive and fun environment.

This year, 36 primary schools across the country took part in the competition. The first stage began in each of the participating schools as the children wrote and later performed their stories in front of their classmates and teachers before a school champion was crowned.

Following this, the winners took up their places in one of three regional finals in the South, Midlands and North, where they performed their stories to an expert panel of judges, including children's storyteller Kevin Graal.

In the face of fierce competition, Sufiyaan took home the Runner Up prize, impressing judges with his story about 'Lazer Boy'. To celebrate his efforts, Sufiyaan received a certificate and a selection of books.

At the final event, pupils also participated in a storytelling workshop, led by Kevin, who equipped the children with the tools and confidence they needed to take to the stage and enthusiastically perform their stories.

The finalists' stories will now be collated and published in the United Learning StorySLAM 2024 Anthology. A copy of this will be sent to each participating school.

Kate Heaton, Principal at William Hulme's Grammar School said:

"This is a fantastic achievement by Sufiyaan and I would like to congratulate him and all our other children who took part in this excellent competition. I am both immensely proud and delighted that our youngest writers at William Hulme's are already achieving such great outcomes in the Primary Phase and look forward to this continuing as they make the transition into our Secondary Phase where there will be further opportunities for them to develop their creativity, confidence, literacy and oracy skills".



All students managed to run/wheel/skip 1km individually, taking us over our 40km total. Taking part in this event formed a personal challenge for all of our students but, during the event, it was fantastic to see the resilience and character shown. Each student earned House points for their teams, for their attitude and effort while taking part.

After the distance was completed, we spoke about the importance of physical activity and sport. All students spoke about the effects that sport and physical activity had on their lives within the school day.

Primary Pupil Leaders' Celebration Event at University of Oxford

This week, a team of our Year 6 pupils enjoyed a special Celebration Day at St Anne's College, University of Oxford to celebrate their completion of the Student Leadership Programme.

Run by United Learning, in partnership with the Dirt is Good Project, the programme challenges pupils across the Group's academies and independent schools to develop and deliver their own social action project, for the benefit of their school, local or wider communities.

Since the programme's launch in November, our pupils have been hard at work carrying out a project to raise awareness of food poverty in Manchester. They have led assemblies, campaigned and visited Manchester South Central Foodbank. Our community provided a huge food donation to the foodbank – providing enough food for 372 meals! Thank you for your contributions.

At this week's exciting Celebration Day, our young leaders saw their excellent efforts celebrated when they presented their project to an audience of around 100 peers and teachers from across other participating schools. The team took to the stage with impressive confidence and enthusiasm and were excellent representatives of our school community.

During their trip, our pupils also got the opportunity to learn more about university life and what it means to be a student at the University of Oxford. The pupils enjoyed a special tour of the College, as well as a taster lecture.

Well done to all our pupils who engaged so wholeheartedly in the programme and, through their project, have made such a real and positive difference to our local community.



Year 9 Gateways

On Wednesday 28 February, a group of Year 9 students participated in the Gateways visit to the University of Manchester.

Our students were shown new sections of the University campus, including some newly built areas. Workshop sessions gave students an opportunity to explore their own potential and improve their personal motivations to succeed at both, during and after their career. Students took part in activities in groups, exploring budgeting at university, the role of a career and investigating the required transferrable skills. This helped students to realise the importance of playing to their key strengths.

The workshops were led by postgraduate students, who helped learners explore different career areas and the skills needed to succeed in each of these areas. All schools participating were entered into a competition, which consisted of a question and answer session and a creative session, where students were required to create their own society.

Our Year 9 students gave an excellent performance, outperforming all the other schools (there were 6 other teams) and convincingly attaining first place. Our students were all awarded a medal, in addition to their certificates.

All students enjoyed the day and found the activities engaging and informative. One of our students commented, "I really enjoyed the competition, especially the creative session".


We also had a special visit by the Lord Mayor of Manchester and Consort; Yasmine Dar and Majid Dar.


All pupils involved represented our school to the highest standard and were inspirational!

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
School Show Production of 'Annie Inr'
