A-Level Results Day 2024

Students and staff are celebrating today after our Sixth Formers received an excellent set of A Level results.

Students at the school have been awarded a raft of the highest A* and A grades and, in doing so, have secured places at their universities of choice, including a host of Russell Group institutions such as Imperial College London and the University of Manchester. Students will be going on to study a wide range of high-quality, competitive courses, from Aerospace Engineering to Computing and Mathematics.

Among those celebrating this morning was 19-year-old Sijabuliso Sibanda who, having only arrived in the UK from Zimbabwe two years ago, achieved four A*s and gained a place to study Aerospace Engineering at the University of Manchester.

Speaking of his success, Sijabuliso said:

"I'm happy but I'm definitely going to miss Sixth Form. WHGS was the first school I went to in the UK and it was really fun. I'll miss the teachers and the students."

Others marking particularly impressive achievements and university offers include:

- Andrii Kravets, who achieved three A*s and a B and gained a place to study Physics at the University of Manchester.



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Year 2 Science – Plant Growth







This half term, Year 2 have been exploring Plant Growth in Science. We explored what a seed is and the different parts of a seed.

To support our understanding of seeds, we dissected a presoaked broad bean. Pupils peeled off the seed coat, carefully split the bean in half and identified the root, shoot, leaves and food store.

Then we learned about the germination process and what seeds need to grow. We carried out an experiment to see what conditions were necessary for seeds to germinate. In our investigation we changed the variables; water, light and soil, and we made predictions about whether the seeds would germinate. We found out that seeds do not need light or soil to germinate. What a lightbulb moment! We realised that germination is actually the growth of the root and the shoot and not the emergence of leaves.

Plant growth is when plants get bigger. Their roots and stem get longer and wider, and more leaves develop. We understood that plants do need light and soil in order to grow healthy. We were blown away with our findings and we have thoroughly enjoyed our Science learning this half term.

Year 5 Bread Making



As part of our Design Technology unit on Food Technology, Year 5 became bakers for the half term.

They planned and designed what their bread would look like, as well as studying how a recipe can ensure consistent and controlled results. They then made the dough in small groups before splitting it into their own piece. Using their plan, they shaped their dough and then added different ingredients, such as chocolate and raisins, to enhance the flavour of their final product.

Finally, after enjoying the taste of their freshly baked bread, they evaluated the successes and areas for improvement.



Year 4 Hindu Temple Visit



Our Year 4 pupils enjoyed an educational visit to the Gita Bhavan Hindu Temple in Manchester, as part of their Religious Education learning about the Hindu faith. The children showed incredible respect throughout the trip, engaging enthusiastically with the temple's serene atmosphere and beautiful, ornate decorations.

The children explored the temple and discovered various religious items through a 'scavenger hunt' activity. At the end of the visit, the children were kindly allowed to take a piece of fruit home as a gesture from the temple.

A big thank you to the Gita Bhavan Temple for allowing us to visit, and to the parent helpers who made the trip possible. It was a wonderful opportunity for our pupils to experience first-hand what they have been learning in the classroom.





Year 4 Science, Sewing and **Marvelous Medicines!**




Year 4 has been busy this half term with a range of exciting, hands-on learning experiences across several subjects!

Celebrating Culture Day



Sixth Form Bar Mock Trial



Our Sixth Form students have been preparing for the Young Citizen's Bar Mock Trial since the beginning of this academic year.

Students have been meeting every Monday after school to prepare their cases, practice their questioning skills and prepare to undergo questioning as witnesses. Students also attended after school sessions to develop their skills and seek advice from members of the legal profession. We were very privileged to be supported by Judge, Leona Harrison. Judge Harrison gave student valuable advice on how to present their arguments and question witnesses. Judge Harrison observed our students' role play the criminal cases and gave students advice on how they could improve their opening/closing statements. Students taking on the role of Barristers were committed to improving their advocacy skills and reflected on the advice given by Judge Harrison. All students taking part worked very hard to prepare for their roles, they worked

collaboratively and supported each other throughout.

On Saturday 9 November, our students took part in the Bar Mock Trial at Manchester Crown Court. This is the first time in the last ten years that the court has opened its doors to the Bar Mock Trial competition. This was an amazing opportunity for the students. They got to walk the corridors of the court and perform their cases in several different court rooms. Our students competed in the North West heat, they were up against other Sixth Form colleges from around the North West.

Prosecution Barristers Cyrus and Pebbles were first to perform. They did great job presenting their cases, questioning witnesses and cross examining the defence witnesses. The Judge commented on the confidence of both barristers and Pebbles was highlighted for the strength of her closing statement.

In the second round, Defence Barristers Fikayo and Hamaad did an amazing job in defending their case. Their opening and closing speeches outlining the law and burden of proof to the jury was a key strength. They won their case and outperformed the other school competing in their questioning of witnesses.

Defence Barristers Ali and Safa did a superb job in defending their case in the third round of the competition. Both students thoroughly questioned and cross-examined witnesses to highlight the evidence for their case. Their opening and closing statements were a key strength that blew away the competition. Their confidence in delivering their statements was a joy to witness.

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Sixth Form Bar Mock Trial





Hamza (round 2) and Abdullah (round 3) played the roles of the defendant. Both students did stand out performances, they knew their statements and were able to confidently respond to tough questioning. Their performances played a vital role in the barristers winning their cases. Hamza diligently learned his witness statement and prepared for questioning. He was nervous before the trial started but this did not come across when he took the stand. He answered every question confidently and clearly. He didn't falter under cross examination and did a fantastic iob. Abdullah was calm and collected on the witness stand. He did an excellent performance as the witness for the defence team in round 3. He made it very difficult for the competing team to cross examine him. He made sure he didn't give the prosecution anything.

Nael, Mustafa, Fatimah and Habeeb played the role of key witnesses for our teams. They all knew their statements; they worked well with their teams to make sure they presented the points the prosecution/defence team wanted them to highlight. They performed very well responding to questioning from other school teams. It was impressive to see the students cope with the questions, particularly under cross examination as they didn't know what they would be asked. They had to listen carefully, respond to the questions and remember their original statement. They didn't falter under the pressure.

Often the unsung heroes of the court are the Court Clerk and the Usher, anyone who works within the court knows how important their roles are. Kolsoom played the role of the Court Clerk in round one. Nimra and Aisha played the role of the Usher in round 2 and 3. All three did stand out performances. They spoke clearly and confidently and took charge of the courtroom by giving instructions to those in the court room, swearing in witnesses and the jury and reading statements.

All students took part being jurors for other schools competing in the competition. They listened diligently to all the evidence presented and came to a verdict of guilty/ not guilty for each case. All students also had a Q&A session with all the Judges and Barristers supporting the day.

Every student thoroughly enjoyed the day and thrived during the competition. Miss Ingham is very proud of how all the students performed and presented themselves during the day in Manchester's Crown Court. They were great representatives of the WHGS community and Sixth Form.

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Year 13 Geography Residential

On Monday 11 November, our five Year 13 A-Level Geographers headed to Rhyd-y-Creuau in Wales' Eryri (Snowdonia) National Park. The purpose of their five-day residential was to practise data collection methods in physical and human geography in order to collect data to use in their Non-Examined Assessments (NEAs) to contribute to their final A-Level grades.

On Monday and Tuesday, Zahra, Nala, Marvelous, Josh and Alysha used their knowledge of the Water and Carbon Cycles to calculate the carbon content of trees in the Conwy catchment, and measure differences in infiltration rates around the FSC site we were staying at. They also re-capped GCSE-level knowledge of coastal defences at Criccieth to measure changes to the beach profile and evaluate the quality of the hard engineering used to protect the coastline along Cardigan Bay.

We spent Wednesday in the seaside town on Llandudno investigating different perspectives of place, taking account of the high streets shops to apply to the 'Clone Town' theory which they had looked at in their Changing Places lessons.

Thursday and Friday were spent working more independently in the peatlands and forests of the Conwy catchment and in Llandudno town centre to collect primary data to be used in their NEAs on themes relating to infiltration rates, changes to retail opportunities and influence of a place's history.

All students really enjoyed their time away, whether it was the late-night films, double portions for breakfast and tea, or completing a variety of practical applications of knowledge and skills that they had looked at in class, and are looking forward to spending time presenting and analysing their data, and finishing their NEAs over the coming months.

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Year 2 Trip to Elizabeth Gaskell House





On Tuesday 17 December, Year 3 and 4 wowed an audience of parents and staff with a beautiful retelling of the Christmas story through a series of readings and songs.


Particular favourites included Hosanna Rock, Oh and Love Shone Down, It Was on a Starry Night and Feliz Navidad.
